

Deciding to travel the challenging road of forgiveness is choosing a journey toward greater freedom. Resentment, anger, and clinging to past hurts not only keep open wounds that long for healing but bring us down paths that are eventually self-destructive. Harboring grudges and withholding forgiveness not only shut down relationships with others, but with God and myself as well. To choose to forgive another person, regardless of how grave the wrong, is a choice to be released from bondage to past wounds and scars and to pursue the gift of life and love again. Who among us has not wrong or sinned against another? We certainly would want God to understand, forgive, and show mercy upon us. It is hypocritical of us to not extend that same grace to our neighbor.

Break the Cycle of Poverty: Support the Catholic Campaign for Human Development

Next Sunday, September 20th, we will take up a collection for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development. CCHD addresses the root causes of poverty in America by supporting community-controlled, self-help organizations of low-income people. Groups made up of refugees, low wage workers, people with disabilities and others on the margins are making real social change through CCHD grants. In addition, 25% of the funds we collect will remain in our diocese to fund smaller, local antipoverty projects.

Here in Monroe County those local projects have included: *Coffee Connections*, a small business which trains and employs women in recovery from addiction, *Mujeras Divinas*, group of immigrant women who empowering themselves to understand their rights and to protect themselves from unhealthy relationships; and *Rochester Alliance of Communities Transforming Society (Roc/ACTS)*, made up of urban and suburban congregations working together for racial and economic justice.

Why Do We Celebrate Grandparents Day?

The History of Grandparents Day

Marian McQuade hoped to establish a national day that would honor grandparents, and in 1970 she began a campaign to do so. McQuade raised awareness about senior citizens throughout the 1970s. In 1978, President Jimmy Carter declared the first Sunday after Labor Day to be National Grandparents Day. Each year, the president issues a proclamation to keep the tradition going.

Grandparents Day has both an official flower and song. The official flower is the forget-me-not, and the song is Johnny Prill's "A Song for Grandma and Grandpa." Both were chosen by the National Grandparents Day Council.

Purpose of Grandparents Day

The purpose of the holiday, as stated in the preamble to the statute, is "to honor grandparents, to give grandparents an opportunity to show love for their children's children, and to help children become aware of the strength, information, and guidance older people can offer."

BIBLE STUDY CORNER

Does anyone harbor anger against another, and expect healing from the Lord? If someone has no mercy towards another like himself, can he then seek pardon for his own sins?

Sirach 28:3-4

Reflection: We know that God is merciful, kind, slow to anger, and rich in compassion. We know that we are made in God's image. It is our lifelong challenge to let go of all that prevents us from being like God in mercy, in kindness, in slowness to anger, and in compassion.

People will hurt us. People will treat us unjustly, abandon us, and reject us. People will shame us, ridicule us, and spread malicious gossip about us. People will steal our ideas, cheat us out of our money, and take advantage of our goodness. People will attempt to undermine our self-confidence, our sense of self-worth, and our self-esteem.

It is human to want vengeance. It is human to want others to be punished for their actions. It is human to want at the very least an apology from those who have hurt us. Yet we have been made in God's image and are called to be merciful, kind, slow to anger, and rich in compassion. We have been called out of our human brokenness to be the face and hands and heart of God in the world.

Despite our human frailty, we are powerful divine beings. We have been given the power to surrender our pain and all the strong emotions that go with it to God. We have been given the power to choose mercy over revenge, kindness over hatred, forgiveness over anger, peace over violence, and compassion over superiority. We have been given the power to be like God in love and goodness.

Ponder: When have I felt the mercy and kindness of God?

Prayer: Lord, I am grateful for your endless mercy. Give me the humility and courage to forgive those who have hurt me.

Practice: With a grateful heart I will forgive someone who has hurt me.
