BIBLE STUDY CORNER

As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fish for people." And immediately they left their nets and followed him.

Mark I:16-18

Reflection: Simon and his brother were comfortable in their job. They were busy doing what they were trained to do: catch fish. With all their mind, heart, soul, and strength, these fishermen earned a living to provide for their families.

On the surface, leaving a job to follow a stranger does not make sense. Yet Simon and Andrew and all the others called by Jesus learned how to fish for people by listening to the teachings of Jesus and watching his work among the people.

Some people get up each moming to do to a job; they do what they were trained to do. Some people get up each moming to go in search of a job so they can earn a living and take care of their families. Whether employed or unemployed, we are invited to do the work of God. God needs faithful workers to help build the kingdom of God on Earth.

Each day our work is to give witness to the Word of God. Training for this work requires a commitment to prayerfully read the Word of God and be mindful enough to share the wisdom of God's teaching with others.

Catching people is like catching fish. We need to be patient. We catch people for the kingdom of God with the grace-filled Word of God. When we set out to do the work of God, we go with the bait of love, compassion, peace, and forgiveness in our hearts, hoping to attract people to Jesus.

Ponder: What is the meaning and purpose of my work?

Prayer: Lord, you call me to do the work of God in the world. Help me to say yes to your work of peace and reconciliation.

Practice: I will share today's reflection with a friend or colleague.
