BIBLE STUDY CORNER

"Do not lay your hand on the boy or don anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your

only son, from me."

Genesis 22:12

Reflection: The child is often a symbol of human weakness and helplessness. Many children worldwide are left homeless, poor, and vulnerable because of natural disasters, poverty. genocide, violence, and war. In this passage we hear and feel the heart of God through the voice of a messenger, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him." God showed great love and concern for Abraham's only son. The heart of God still speaks to us today and calls us to show great love and concern for the weakest members of the human family. The heart of God demands that we take care of our children and do nothing to harm their mental, emotional, spiritual, and physical well-being. The heart of God challenges us anew to do whatever we can to put an end to the exploitation of innocent children. The heart of God illuminates our obligation to do more to protect all children regardless of their race, culture, religious tradition, and social condition. All children are signs of God's presence among us. We are the heart of God empowered by the Spirit to advocate for the weak and powerless and to show great love and concern for children everywhere.

Ponder: How do I reveal the heart of God in the world?

Prayer: Lord, you watch over me and love me as your child. Help me to see all people as your children and treat them with gentleness, love, and support.

Practice: Today I will pray for gentleness of heart; I will fast from hurtful thoughts and behavior; I will be a good role model for children and youth.

YOUTH INVITED TO APPLY FOR SUMMER EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS

Mayor Lovely A. Warren, Monroe County and RochesterWorks! invite youth ages of 14—20 to apply for the City's Summer of Opportunity Program (SOOP) and RochesterWorks! Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP).

"The Summer of Opportunity and Summer Youth Employment programs provide our youth with essential, real world experience," said Mayor Warren. "Through this experience, they can gain the skills they need to advance to successful careers in a competitive job market. Helping to build up our future generation of leaders is key to our mission of creating more jobs, which leads to safer, more vibrant neighborhoods, better educational opportunities and greater equity in the city of Rochester."

Both programs provide 6-8 weeks of paid employment for youth currently enrolled in middle school, high school or actively pursuing their high school equivalency diploma. Youth who participate in SOOP/SYEP learn skills to prepare them for the workforce and promote school success. Selection for these programs is competitive and not every applicant is guaranteed placement in a job.

Registration for both programs takes place March 1–26 at rocsummeryouth.com. Applicants must then upload their Social Security card, work permit, a recent report card, photo ID and a signed Application Signature report to doccollect.rochesterworks.org.

New COVID-19 Strains, Herd Immunity & Our Return to "Normal"

New variants of the COVID-19 virus have emerged. Are these new strains more contagious? Are two masks better than one? We asked these questions and more to Dr. Lisa Harris, Vice President of Medical Affairs at Excellus BlueCross BlueShield. There's a lot we know, but there's also a lot we don't know as the COVID-19 situation continues to evolve. Dr. Harris shares the latest below.



Dr. Lisa Y. Harris is Vice President of Medical Affairs at Excellus BlueCross BlueShield. She is a Fellow of the American College of Physicians, Fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics and a Certified Physician Executive through the American Association of Physician Leaders. Board certified in Internal Medicine and Pediatrics, Dr. Harris has been in clinical practice since 1995.

Q: Dr. Harris, it's been reported that there are new strains of the COVID-19 virus—now within the United States. What is the latest information on this?

The CDC has reported three new strains globally. These were first found in the UK, South Africa, and Brazil, and all three new strains have been seen in the U.S. as of the end of January 2021. Based on case counts, these new strains seem to spread more easily and faster than the original virus. Though they may be more contagious, there is no evidence to prove that these strains are deadlier.

Q: The vaccine gives hope to many people right now. If a person receives the COVID-19 vaccine, will it protect them against these new strains? Will the vaccine still be 95% effective?

So far, the data suggests that the current vaccines will also protect against the virus variants (new strains). A 95% effective rate has not been proven against the new variants yet, but it is being studied closely.

Q: We know the importance of washing our hands, social distancing, and wearing a mask. But, what about double masking? Should we be wearing two masks instead of one?

There is data that supports double masking, especially if you do not have a medical grade mask. A way to think about it is that wearing one mask protects you from me, but the additional mask protects me from you. Another option would be wearing a mask that has two layers, or an insert for additional protection. Gaiters when folded to create 2-3 layers are considered effective.

Q: If someone has already had COVID-19 and recovered or received the COVID-19 vaccine, is it safe to start doing "normal" activities like travel?

It depends on your definition of safe. It's important to remember that the pandemic still exists, and the threat of the virus remains. Neither the vaccine nor prior COVID-19 exposure grants you 100% immunity from the virus. While receiving the vaccine may make you highly unlikely to get a serious case of COVID-19, the evidence suggests that you may still be able to transfer COVID-19 to someone else. Based on those risks, the CDC recommends delaying travel and staying home to protect yourself and others. If emergency travel is necessary, different states have different travel requirements and a negative COVID-19 test is required for all airlines.
