

BIBLE STUDY CORNER

"For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away."

Matthew 25:14-16

Reflection: We are surrounded by people with diverse talents. Some people have a talent for cooking, weaving, embroidering, designing, building, landscaping, painting, plumbing, teaching, counseling, coaching, public speaking, advertising, business accounting, playing a musical instrument, writing, drawing, photography, leadership, administration, management, health care and human services, and physical training. We recognize and support people who demonstrate extraordinary ability in their particular craft.

We focus more on the talents of people that can be demonstrated and observed. We assess their value, usefulness, and effectiveness based on outcomes. We give little attention to the talents of kindness, love, compassion, peace, patience, forgiveness, and justice that reside in our hearts. These universal talents are given to us, intended to be used for the common good, no matter what our position in life. These are the talents that are often ignored, understated, and undervalued. We do not see the connection between these talents and our physical talents. We fail to bring forth into our work these talents that can make a positive impact on people's lives and change the world.

The gospel keeps us focused on God, the source and foundation of our lives. We can do nothing apart from God. Every gift and talent we possess comes from God. We do not exercise our gifts and talents for our own benefit, but to build up and make present in our lives the kingdom of God on earth. As Jesus' disciples, we are empowered with God's gifts to increase love, compassion, and peace among all people. We are called to use our gifts and talents to do God's will.

Ponder: What are my gifts and talents?

Prayer: Lord, I am grateful for all your blessings. Help me to use your gifts of love and compassion to rebuild people's lives.

Practice: With a grateful heart I will use my gifts and talents for good.

The following prayer of Saint Katharine can be integrated into our daily lives.

Lord where do You dwell? He dwells in the little opportunities which arise of doing well, or of suffering well. He dwells in the humble homes as in His consecrated hosts and beneath the appearance of chance annoyances, of disagreeable illnesses, of unprofitable work, of sacrifices claimed, of meritorious obedience... under these appearances, He is morally present as He is corporally present under the Eucharistic species. And my life passes close to these His dwellings and my days meet them at each moment. Open my eyes for me, O Lord, and may I learn to know You in the sanctifying grace of daily duties.

(Saint Katharine was one of the saints canonized by Pope John II on October 1, 2000. she was known for her dedication to correct injustice and racial discrimination towards African American and Native Americans.)

LIVE THE LITURGY ~ Inspiration for the week

God has entrusted his possessions to us. God's possessions are not earthly, physical things like ours; a home, bank account, personal items, and so forth. God's possessions are far greater and deeper. God's greatest possession is His very Self and it is precisely this pearl of great price that He bestows freely upon us. What are we going to do with it? Nourishing the fruits of wisdom is of the first order in determining how we are going to use what God has given. Understanding that His gift has not been given purely for our self-benefit is another. Wisdom asks us to broaden our horizons to embrace all avenues of human life. including the needs of the poor, the marginalized, and the needy. Manifested primarily in the virtues of faith, hope, and love, what God has entrusted to us can multiply exponentially if we invest His gift wisely and reap the greatest benefits. While it requires a great deal of focus and persistent hard work, we will experience tremendous joy when we realize just how much confidence God has in us. Not acting on something out of fear or lack of trust serves no purpose and is of not use to either God or ourselves.

Holy Redeemer is the only parish founded by Black Catholics still housed in its original site in the city.

In 1858, Saint Katharine Drexel was born into great wealth in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. As she grew up, Saint Katharine's parents taught her that their money was meant to be shared with others. Saint Katharine took this to heart throughout her long life, especially in service to suffering Native and African Americans. She gave more than 21 million dollars of her own money to help found dozens of churches, schools and hospitals across the United States. Besides founding her own religious congregation of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, Saint Katharine also established Xavier University in New Orleans, Louisiana. It's the only Catholic African American College in the country. Saint Katharine Drexel died in 1955 and became a saint in the year 2000.
